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"Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives; the one who seeks finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened." Matthew 7:7-8



TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

As a father of 3 children, I am often bombarded with requests. Each of my children asks my wife and I for things regularly. It can often feel never-ending! Dad, can I play outside? Dad, can I go to the game with friends? Dad, can we go get ice cream? Mom, can I get a ride to the mall and go shopping? You get my drift. At times it can be annoying and bothersome but yet this is how our heavenly father wants us to bother him in prayer. He gives us permission to bother him in prayer. We should be encouraged to submit requests to Him daily. All kinds of requests, things that keep you up at night, difficult circumstances that you continue to worry about, and breakthroughs in a particular area of your life.

In Matthew 7, Jesus tells his disciples to 'ask' God, but this 'ask' is a persistent asking. In Philippians 4, Paul writes, Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. This is a reminder that our loving Father longs for us to ask of him. Asking God in prayer strengthens our relationship with him. Be specific about your request. Even though God knows what you want and need. He wants you to ask Him for it. God can answer vague prayers but being specific creates a deeper bond between you and Him.

God wants us to ask and ask again, not simply because he told us to pray, but because when we pray, we open another window for his glory to stream through. Throughout scripture, God invites us to ask of him. What a heavenly invitation! Although parents often ask their children to stop bothering them with requests, our heavenly Father does not operate this way. He is longing to hear from us daily.

When was the last time you asked God in prayer for a specific, bold, and audacious request?

TODAY'S PRAYER:

Lord, may we be people that will bring daily requests to you. I thank you that you love giving good gifts to your children. We repent for our prayerlessness and ask you to give us a passion for prayer. In Jesus' name, Amen.



DAY 02 TUESDAY, JANUARY 30

God mercifully responds when we honestly, humbly, hungrily repent. The wonderful news is that our Lord is a God of mercy, and He responds to repentance. - Billy Graham

And the word of the LORD came unto Jonah the second time, saying, Arise, go unto Nineveh, that great city, and preach unto it the preaching that I bid thee. So Jonah arose, and went unto Nineveh, according to the word of the LORD. Now Nineveh was an exceeding great city of three days' journey. And Jonah began to enter into the city a day's journey, and he cried, and said, Yet forty days, and Nineveh shall be overthrown. So the people of Nineveh believed God, and proclaimed a fast, and put on sackcloth, from the greatest of them even to the least of them. Jonah 3:1-5



TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

We are living in a time in our society when we can have a negative reaction to certain words. Words that can be labeled as traditional, outdated, obsolete, or unnecessary. However, there is a word that is still essential to our Christian experience. That word is repentance. Repent means to feel such sorrow for sin or fault as to be disposed to change one's life for the better; be penitent. Repentance is essential for us to establish a personal relationship with God through our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

In the text above we find the people of Nineveh repenting for their sins in order to reestablish a right relationship with God. Sin separates us from God. Repentance restores our relationship with God. What is something that keeps us from repentance? Pride is something that gets in the way of repentance. We often do not want to admit that we have done wrong, and we want to justify our own actions. What should we do to repent? We should humble ourselves and allow God's Word to lead us to repentance. In the text in Jonah chapter three, we see that Jonah delivered the Word of God to the people of Nineveh. The King and the people of Nineveh were humble and repented of their sins in response to God's Word.

Let us learn from the people of Nineveh and experience the great love and mercy of God. God sent His son Jesus to redeem us from our sins. It was the greatest expression of His love for the world. John 3:16 For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. Will you respond to God's word today and repent of any sin in your life? God is ready and willing to forgive you if you will humbly repent.

TODAY'S PRAYER:

Dear Heavenly Father, please help convict me of sin and help me accept your mercy without shame. I repent of all sin and anything that is wrong in my life. Thank you for the love you have poured out for me and all of your children. Help me live out of that love today. In Jesus' Name I Pray, Amen.

TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

Life's demands can easily consume us in a never-ending cycle of busyness, anxiety, and stress. In a world that often spins in chaos and turmoil, we have to learn how to be still and know that God is still working on our behalf. TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

There is a spiritual significance to going. I am already familiar with where I am staying. When I stay I know the people, the geography, the dangers, the back up plans. When I stay I know the culture, I support the culture and most others are perpetuating that culture as well.

When you go there is nothing familiar. There is nothing to be expected. Wherever I go they won't do things the way I did them before. I will always have more questions than answers. TODAY'S PRAYER:

TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

Mary – A Model of Surrender (Luke 1:26-38)

Mary wasn't anyone special. She was young, unknown, relatively poor, from a place no one special lives. And yet, she was special. Gabriel appears and calls her "highly favored." She was greatly troubled by this greeting. Surprisingly, the text remains silent about her shocking exposure to a mighty angel of God. It wasn't the presence of God's messenger that troubled her. She was "greatly troubled at his words and wondered what kind of greeting this might be." What kind of greeting is this? Highly favored? Evidently, God saw something of great favor in this young lady long before she saw it in herself.

You know the story. She was favored by God – chosen by Him to bear His son. The Savior of the world would grow within her womb, be nurtured in her arms, learn from her song and instruction. Why would God choose one so simple and declare such praise regarding one so young, untried, plain? While God's will often remains a mystery to humans, we are told that the "LORD sees not as man sees: man looks on the outward appearance, but the LORD looks on the heart" (I Samuel 16:7). There was something about her heart that thrilled God. She was soft-hearted, yielded, ready to surrender. Thrilling! Exhilarating to Abba!

Mary had questions. She sought a few clarifications. How can a virgin become pregnant and remain pure to her marriage vows? The questions were real and valid; but the heart never wavered. We see the culmination of Mary's special bending towards God when she declares quietly and resolutely, "I am the Lord's servant.... May your word to me be fulfilled." When Gabriel heard the words, he was satisfied that the message was received, and he left.

Surrender is enough. Surrender is the starting point for the great journey of God and man together. Surrender is the gateway to adventure with Christ. With these simple words, this unknown girl became the mother of our Lord – highly favored among men and God alike.

Surrender resides in humility. The text teaches us that Mary first saw herself as the "Lord's servant." The haughty refuse to surrender. Pride demands control, recognition, justice. Perhaps this is the reason that "God opposes the proud but shows favor to the humble" (James 4:6). Surrender yields itself for the benefit of another. Surrender sacrifices. It embraces rejection by the crowds and misunderstanding by friends to follow God's surprising plan. It trusts, receives, refuses to demand.

Mary was willing to be inconvenienced by God's plan. She had to know that her life was changing forever and that many would think poorly of her. What about you? Are you ready to serve the Lord this year, however he asks? Are you okay with being lowly; but Highly Favored? Are you surprised when God places His favor on you through the callings he deposits into your heart? Are you ready to risk the "seemingly certain" to traverse the gateway of the "sometimes foggy" plans of God? Mary risked it. The angels gloried with chorus because of it. The Magi traveled and gifted in response to it. Surrender became God's glorious gateway to the supernatural work of salvation. Let 2024 be the year of glory and surrender for you as well.

TODAY'S PRAYER:

Lord, today I come before you in humility. I declare that no promise of God will ever fail. Though I may not always understand your plans and your ways, I fully surrender myself to You. I trust you and ask you to give me the peace and confident to walk this day in full submission to your will. In Jesus' name, Amen.

I want to know Christ. Philippians 3:10



Prayer has never come easy to me. I understand the value of it, and I've experienced the value of it firsthand! I've read books on prayer, taught about prayer, and know various prayer models. But it's still a mystery and a struggle. Not necessarily praying itself, but keeping it from becoming stale, keeping it from becoming another item on my checklist, keeping it from becoming a religious exercise that has little room for God to move.

A few years ago, I decided to set aside certain times on certain days and dedicate that time to focused prayer (even though it can be a struggle, I know it's vital to my faith). The other day, I had just returned from an out-of-town trip, and I got my days mixed up. The first item on my calendar was to spend 30 minutes in prayer. I had many things that needed to get done, but that only meant I needed to pray more, not less. But as I thought through my day, I realized my mistake: I was thinking about the wrong day. On this particular day, my focused prayer time was at the end of the day, not the beginning. This would allow me to jump right into doing what needed to get done.

As I realized this, a thought bounced around in my head: "I don't have to pray," and it was followed by an emotion, gratitude. I was glad I didn't have to pray. Do you see the problem? In my effort to make prayer central to my life, I had actually made it a chore. Excitement and joy were replaced by the mundane and "this is just one more thing I need to do" attitude.

How's your prayer life? How would you describe it? Is it life-giving? Stale? Exciting? Boring? Have you given up on prayer? I haven't worked this out yet, but here are some things I'm learning:

- Practice silence
- Pray while walking around, sitting, or kneeling
- Balance prayer between supplications, gratitude, worship, confession, and intercession
- Be honest in prayer (don't worry, God can handle it).
- Try something new.

These are some of the questions I've been asking myself. If you find yourself in a similar position with prayer, ask yourself these questions:

- Do you pray because you have to or because you get to (or even want to)?
- Are your prayer times meaningful or meaningless? Why? What needs to change?
- If you spoke to your spouse with the same energy and effort you speak to God, would that relationship be healthy?

Let's get to know the Lord through prayer!

TODAY'S PRAYER:

Dear Lord Jesus, we come before you with hearts full of gratitude for the precious gift of knowing You. In our lives and hearts, we acknowledge You as the Way, the Truth, and the Life.

Lord, with all the distractions and noise in this life, help us to know You. May we surrender our calendars, agendas, and ambitions so we can slow down long enough to simply be with You. We can be so caught up in accomplishing tasks that we miss You. Forgive us, Lord.

May we be vessels of Your mercy, instruments of Your peace, and reflections of Your boundless love. In moments of joy, let us give thanks to You. In moments of struggle, let us find strength in You. Lord, help us to know You more intimately each day so that our lives may testify to Your transformative power. In Your holy name, we pray. Amen.





"When this is done, I will go to the king, even though it is against the law. And if I perish, I perish." Esther 4:16



TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

One of the most famous quotations in all the Old Testament must be from Queen Esther! "If I perish, let me perish, I'm going to see the King!" Esther's was a life of submission! Largely because of her great beauty, Esther was elevated to queen when her predecessor Queen Vashti was deposed.

Many of us find success either by hard work, luck, or serendipity, or as often happens we get elevated, appointed, or selected simply because of who we know, or how we look! In these situations, it's easy to become tempted to convince ourselves that it was our own hard work or availability or education or connections etc. that led us to our achievements. And while that may be true to a certain extent, it is foolish not to consider the hand of God in our successes!

It was only when Esther realized at the urging of Mordecai, that she was not so insulated as she might have believed and that she was uniquely "positioned", she agreed to use her status to bring about justice!

Let us "offer our bodies as living sacrifices" (Rom. 12:1) in total submission to God's purpose, power, and plans! Let us be encouraged to speak truth to power for the cause of justice! Let us remember who the real King is! And like Esther, submit to Him mind, body, and soul!

TODAY'S PRAYER:

Lord, thank you for your graciousness, in opening the doors of opportunity to us! And with our successes, please remind us from whence our blessings come, and to whom they belong! May we be willing to approach worldly kings boldly, on behalf of the King of Kings! Amen.





Then Jesus went with his disciples to a place called Gethsemane, and he said to them, "Sit here while I go over there and pray." He took Peter and the two sons of Zebedee along with him, and he began to be sorrowful and troubled. Then he said to them, "My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death. Stay here and keep watch with me." Going a little farther, he fell with his face to the ground and prayed, "My Father, if it is possible, may this cup be taken from me. Yet not as I will, but as you will." Matthew 26:36-39



TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

If you are like me, there may have been times in your life when your soul was overwhelmed with sorrow. God has a plan and purpose for each of our lives. TODAY'S PRAYER:

Lord, though sometimes I feel overwhelmed, please give me the grace to fulfill my assignment in your kingdom. If I don't surrender to your will and fulfill my assignment, people in my family, my city, my state, my nation and the world, will be lost! I surrender all, today! Amen





"Godly sorrow brings repentance that leads to salvation and leaves no regret, but worldly sorrow brings death." 2 Corinthians 7:10



TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

Repentance may be hard for us. We don't want to be wrong and we may be hesitant to repent. Maybe embarrassment, fear or pride presents a barrier but I want you to consider the beauty of repentance.

It is beautiful in that it relieves us, cleanses us and releases the move of God in our lives. If you view what you have done as a fatal, disastrous failure, consider the greatness of God's mercy to completely cover the wrong. Rejoice in that.

Repentance is a healing for the sickness of sin. God isn't keeping score or rendering retribution. He forgives repeatedly, completely and enormously.

Repentance is not limited to sorrow for our wrongs. It includes thankfulness for forgiveness. It includes the joy of being washed and refreshed.

Pursue it, embrace it, love it, rejoice in it. Hallelujah!

TODAY'S PRAYER:

Heavenly Father, Thank you for the beauty and power of repentance. As we acknowledge our shortcomings, I ask that you allow your Spirit to wash us, refresh us and fill us with your joy and victory. In the Name of Jesus, Amen.





"If you cling to your life, you will lose it; but if you give up your life for Me, you will find it." Matthew 10:39



TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

I think it is relatively safe to say that most Christians have a desire to live fully surrendered to God. But a desire to surrender, and the actual act of laying down our will in exchange for His, can prove to be a challenge for many of us, whether we will admit it or not. The key to surrender is obedience. It is, as Jesus prayed, "...Nevertheless, not my will, but Yours, be done." [Luke 22:42] What happens when God's desire for our lives stands in stark contrast to the desires we have for ourselves? How do we respond when He begins to pry out of our hands, the things we cling so tightly to? Matthew 10:39 tells us... "If you cling to your life, you will lose it; but if you give up your life for Me, you will find it." [Jesus speaking] This stands in stark contrast to how we are wired, doesn't it? Statements like these are, well, ...scary!

The act of surrendering itself is scary. And even risky at times. It is natural for us to "cling" to our desires, our preferences and our comforts. Usually, we don't mind surrendering, but only if it makes sense for us to do so. But, what about when it doesn't make sense? Oddly enough, Matthew's account of Jesus' words is not the first time we are presented with this idea of senseless surrender. There is a story in the book of Jeremiah, Chapter 38, of King Zedekiah, who was faced with a choice to clench and cling, or to senselessly surrender his very life! Just to set it up – the prophet Jeremiah was in trouble. He was thrown into an empty cistern, with a thick layer of mud at the bottom (which, of course, made him sink). He was thrown in the cistern for warning the officials and the people of Jerusalem, that everyone who stayed there would die from war, famine, or disease. But those who would surrender to the Babylonians would live. Their reward for surrendering would be life. [verse 2] Eventually, King Zedekiah had his officials bring Jeremiah to him so he could question Jeremiah about what the LORD had told him. Here's how that conversation went down.

Jeremiah 38:17-18 "Then Jeremiah said to Zedekiah, "This is what the Lord God of Heaven's Armies, the God of Israel, says: 'If you surrender to the Babylonian officers, you and your family will live, and the city will not be burned down. But if you refuse to surrender, you will not escape! This city will be handed over to the Babylonians, and they will burn it to the ground." Okay then it gets good! Look at the next couple of verses: Jeremiah 38:19-20 "But I am afraid to surrender," the king said, "for the Babylonians may hand me over to the Judeans who have defected to them. And who knows what they will do to me!" Jeremiah replied, "You won't be handed over to them if you choose to obey the Lord. Your life will be spared, and all will go well for you." Sometimes, surrendering feels like a death trap when we consider the possible outcomes that are very much out of our control. It takes courage to surrender. It takes courage and trust, to obey. Incidentally, the prophet Jeremiah told the king that if he chose NOT to surrender, a whole list of other problems awaited. [verses 21-23]

What's the point of all this? Glad you asked! The moral of the story is not that we must surrender to our enemies. It is that we must surrender to the sovereign authority and instruction of God, and choose obedience even when we are terrified of the potential outcome. A surrendered heart is one that trusts God no matter what; come what may. Is that you? If not, what is it that you are clinging to? Is holding on too tightly worth losing your life? Is letting go worth finding it? Tough questions, I know. But, obedience is obedience, pure and simple.

Either we will obey, or we won't. Either we will let Him have all of us, or we won't. This brings us back to Matthew 10:39 when Jesus said, "If you cling to your life, you will lose it; but if you give up your life for Me, you will find it." Don't be afraid to surrender completely to God. He has AMAZING blessings for you on the other side of surrender and obedience!

TODAY'S PRAYER:

Heavenly Father, I lay down my life before You in full surrender. Help me to walk in obedience to Your will. Forgive me for the times when I have clenched and clung to my desires instead of Yours. I give You permission to pry my hands open, when You are asking me to let go and trust You. Give me the courage to surrender. And an even greater desire to be obedient to You, no matter the cost. I praise You, Lord, because You are all-powerful, and all-knowing. I place my full trust in You, and no one else. May You create in me a heart that always seeks to do Your will, Your way, in Your time. Amen.





"The woman left her water jar beside the well and ran back to the village, telling everyone" John 4:28



TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

When the woman from Sychar approached Jacob's Well, an ancient water source essential for survival in the days of Samaria, she carried her water jar—a symbol of life's necessities like drinking, cooking, and cleaning. Little did she know that she would encounter Jesus at the well.

Engaging in a profound conversation covering culture, philosophy, relationships, religion, spirituality, and identity, the woman underwent a transformative experience. Throughout the dialogue, Jesus attentively listened, responding in a way that offered her a new perspective on the world and herself. As their conversation concluded, the woman made a significant gesture— she left her water jar.

Leaving her water jar became an act of repentance. She relinquished dependence on her own abilities and efforts, now relying on the Messiah. The burden of survival was lifted; she embraced life with newfound vigor. No longer traversing her journey alone, she extended invitations to others to join her.

Reflecting on repentance, consider how encountering Jesus has changed your life. Following Jesus should alter the patterns of our existence. When we meet the Messiah, that encounter should be evident to those observing us.

How is your life visibility different as a result of your encounter with Jesus?

TODAY'S PRAYER:

Heavenly Father, you understand our pursuit of successful and fulfilling lives. Guide us to meaningful encounters with Jesus, revealing that you are our source of life. Lead us to repent from relying solely on ourselves, recognizing that you know us completely and offer the "living water" that satisfies our lives beyond measure. I ask this in the name of Jesus! Amen.

For just as we share abundantly in the sufferings of Christ, so also our comfort abounds through Christ. If we are distressed, it is for your comfort and salvation; if we are comforted, it is for your comfort, which produces in you patient endurance of the same sufferings we suffer. And our hope for you is firm, because we know that just as you share in our sufferings, so also you share in our comfort." 2 Corinthians 1:5-7



TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

Have you ever been held together, or have you ever felt the peace that surpasses all understanding in the middle of your valley? If you have, then you have now been equipped with first hand experience about the comfort of God! That comfort became available to you through the prayers of those around you who have been contending for you. So now, we can take the comfort that God poured over us to enable us to bring comfort to others. We now become conduits for the comfort of the almighty God.

My wife and I saw that first hand in 2023. I never fully understood the power of "showing up" before my dad's funeral. The day of my dad's funeral, I was broken into a million little pieces, shattered, held together by the prayers of those praying for us. But, seeing people - brothers and sisters from our flock take time off of work and off of school to take a 3 hour trip, not just to simply pay respects or to give any advice, or have the right thing to say but just to show compassion and comfort with their presence, wow. You have no idea what that did for me. That's what gave me the strength I needed to help lead the service at my dad's funeral. Man, there is power through the holy spirit in simply showing up. Every person that made that trip holds a special place in my heart that will never go away or be extinguished. They have impacted my life forever and I now understand what showing up means. By showing up, the spirit of the Lord that lives inside of you brings the comfort and the compassion and the strength and the bravery, it brings the Paraclete. You don't ever have to say anything, you don't have to put the right words together, God does all of that for you when you take the time to simply show up.

Church, we won't always have the answer to why we suffer. But just know that when we suffer, the God of all comfort is there to comfort us, and once we experience that comfort we can now turn and comfort someone else who is going through suffering. The suffering you personally endured turns into the fuel and experience you need to bombard the gates of heaven with prayers of all kinds for your brother or sister whose going through it.

What positivity can we pull from suffering, if any? Two fold- empathy and evangelism. When you're standing in the gap for someone who is suffering you can now understand from a front row perspective what that feels like. So, you can pray in specifics for the strength that you know they'll need. You can now share about the peace that surpasses all understanding only available through a personal relationship with Jesus Christ.

TODAY'S PRAYER:

Lord help me to bring comfort to those who are struggling or suffering through the power of simply showing up. In Jesus Name, Amen.





Therefore, I urge first of all that petitions, prayers, requests, and thanksgiving be made on behalf of all people. I Timothy 2:1



TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

Throughout life we all face crises from time to time. Sometimes the crises are severe, threatening the stability and security of our lives. Other times some situations are less critical, but in such times we stand in desperate need of help. The story of Esther gives us a picture of how intercession works. Can you image God choose a young woman to save a nation at a critical time in Jewish history? A whole race of people had been decreed by law to be slaughtered and at that time only two people could help them: Mordecai and his daughter Esther. For this very purpose, she had been raised up by God to sit on the throne as intercessor and queen for such a time as this. Esther made the courageous decision and demonstrated a willingness to risk her position and even her life to rescue her people from destruction. As Queen, she stood the best chance of appealing to King Xerxes for mercy. If she perished, then she would perish, but she would have fulfilled God's purpose for her life.

Just like the people in the book of Esther then needed someone to stand in the gap for them before the king, even now, so many people are in need of someone standing before the King of Kings in intercessional prayer. Even though Queen Esther risked going into the king's presence uncalled for, the Lord is calling us to the secret place to intercede for a whole nation of people to be healed. "Let us therefore come boldly to the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need." [Hebrews 4:16]

Are we willing to relinquish our agendas and busy schedules to God's will and purposes to be fulfilled in others? Are we willing to risk our positions to rescue others from destruction? Are we willing to fight the fight of faith from the place of total surrender? Surrender is a choice, an act of faith and the only way to walk closely with God. A surrendered heart opens the door for God to work in us and bless others around us. Surrendering to God increases our faith because we trust Him to lead our lives through critical situations. And not only our lives but those of our family, our church, and loved ones. We may not understand all that God is doing but let's be faithful to "trust in the Lord with all our heart, and lean not on our own understanding; In all our ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct our paths." [Proverbs 3:5-6]

Choose to relinquish today to what God is asking you to do. It starts with prayer; a surrendered heart and letting Him talk to you. At whatever point God calls us to respond, to be obedient, and to surrender to doing whatever he asks of us, we'll be like Esther to make a courageous decision and act accordingly on behalf of others to be rescued by a loving King.

What beautiful lyrics to the hymn of I Surrender All Hymn by J.W. Van Deventer. All to Jesus I surrender; All to him I freely give; I will ever love and trust him, In his presence daily live. I surrender all, I surrender all, all to thee, my blessed Savior, I surrender all.

TODAY'S PRAYER:

TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

However, as we know from the story, something miraculous happened when the disciples released what was in their hands to the people. What once wasn't enough... multiplied and became more than enough. Releasing is challenging. Dying to the notion of "mine" is even more difficult. However, both are necessary to aid a spiritual renewal in our city.

We may feel like we need more people, time, or resources but what's in our hands is enough. We can be part of a multiplying miracle when we release what has been stewarded to us and place it in God's hands. We have a city of people starving for the gospel. God is asking us to rest in His sufficiency and release what's in our hands till every man, woman, and child hears the good news!

TODAY'S PRAYER:

Father, you are so good and full of grace. We thank you that you are sufficient in all things. We long to see you continue to move in our city. Would you help us die to ourselves daily and place your agenda above ours. Help us to operate in bold faith and release the little in our hands so that we might see your kingdom continue to multiply throughout Houston and beyond. In Jesus' Name, amen!

Jabez was more honorable than his brothers. His mother had named him Jabez, saying, "I gave birth to him in pain." Jabez cried out to the God of Israel, "Oh, that you would bless me and enlarge my territory! Let your hand be with me, and keep me from harm so that I will be free from pain." And God granted his request. 1 Chronicles 4:9-10



TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

There is a very powerful prayer found in 1 Chronicles by a man named Jabez. We learn that there is power in a genuine prayer. In this short prayer, Jabez prayed for four things: blessing, influence, presence, and protection. We need to be praying for the same things. We need to have the same desire as Jabez did. Personally, my favorite part of the prayer was when Jabez prayed, "let you hand be on me." In other words, he prayed for God's Presence in his life. Do you know why you need the hand of God on you? Because you can't do it by yourself.

Last summer I took my family to a waterpark and my 8 year old son, who is autistic, was terrified. He didn't want to go into the water at first. The next day he got a lot more comfortable and played in the splash pad area. But then he saw the slides and he wanted to do it, but was scared. Well, I dragged him up to the kiddie slide, and he was fighting me, but together we went down the slide and he loved it. Then he wanted to do it again so we did. But then I was like, I wonder if he would did the big twisting slide. He watched his brother do it, and his cousins. So I picked him up and together went to the big slide. We climbed all the way to the top and he was nervous. He wasn't letting go of me. I told the lifeguard he was autistic and this was a big deal and she was so sweet to Jace. But together we went down the big boy slide and he loved it and he wanted to do it again. So we it did again and again and then we got up there and I was wondering if he would do it by himself. I placed him on the slide by himself, he was nervous and I was like you can do this Jace. The lifeguard was encouraging him as well and then I put my hand on him and gave him a little push with mom waiting for him at the bottom and he did it! And then he went all the way up the steps again holding me by the hand and he wanted to do it again by himself this time and so he did, over and over!

See this is what your father's hand is like. You tell him this is too big for me but then you step out in faith to do it and say things that only come from his hand. Afterwards your spirit is shouting, God did that, nobody else. God carried me, He gave me the words, He gave me the power, He gave me the little push that I needed and it was awesome.

The hand of God can be upon you and you will be able to do things you didn't think were even possible. When we ask for God's mighty presence like Jabez did, you will also see tremendous results that can only be explained as the hand of God.

Where there is no prayer, there is no power.

TODAY'S PRAYER:

Today began to pray for the presence of God in your life. Ask for His hand to be on you. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

When Esther's words were reported to Mordecai, he sent back this answer: "Do not think that because you are in the king's house you alone of all the Jews will escape. And who knows but that you have come to your royal position for such a time as this?" Esther replied to Mordecai: Go, gather together all the Jews....fast for me. When this is done, I will go to the king....If I perish, I perish. Esther 4:12-16



TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:

A most memorable surrender in war was at the end of the Civil War. General Lee and his troops surrendered the General Grant. A few days later, General Lee and his troops walked past Union generals, stacking their rifles one at a time. This is complete surrender. Hence, the confession for such a time as this: "If I perish, I perish." The result was the salvation of all her people.

Surrender always leads to salvation, deliverance, and victory! As congregations and Believers in Texas, let's embrace our divine moments this year. Surrender All!

Lord, we choose to surrender to you rather than surrendering all to the powerless idols of this world. Awaken us, dear Lord. TODAY'S DEVOTIONAL:
